## **CCRSP 2023-24** Achievement Report

The CCRSP is delighted to be able to share its annual Achievement Report for 2023-24.



This report aims to highlight some of the key deliverables and successes against the cross-cutting themes set out in the CCRSP Employment and Skills Plan 2022-25.

#### Namely:

- 1. Strengthening the post-16 education offer in priority sectors through increased specialisation to meet the demand from employers across the City Region.
- 2. Broadening the apprenticeship offer at higher levels by responding to government policy changes.
- 3. Engaging with key stakeholders when delivering Wales's employability agenda and targeting individuals furthest away from the labour market.
- 4. Promoting digital technology as a key 'enabling' sector and creating a workforce that has the digital skills, capability, and confidence to excel in the workplace.
- 5. Developing skills to support the transition towards a low carbon economy.
- 6. Influencing the work of Qualifications Wales and maximising opportunities to ensure that emerging qualifications meet industry needs.
- 7. Building on approaches to careers education, information, advice and guidance to address issues of sector perception and promoting key sectors as viable career options.

The document also reports on the progress made against a range of priority sector challenges and opportunities again set through the Employment and Skills Plan. Related interventions have supported economic growth across the region through enhanced productivity.

Between April 2023 and March 2024, the CCRSP successfully delivered a range of activities across the post-16 education sector and further detail can be reviewed in the Achievement Report via the following <u>link</u>.

## Youth-friendly employment and skills plan and career guides

In November 2022, the CCRSP published an Employment & Skills Plan (2022–2025) which set out the skills related challenges and opportunities for the key sectors across southeast Wales.

More recently and funded through the Welsh Government Young Persons Guarantee (YPG) workstream, the CCRSP has produced a youthfriendly version of the plan using simplified language and visual aids. This has helped to ensure that young people are able to better understand and relate with the content, thus inspiring and motivating a broader audience.

The revised version of the Employment and Skills Plan 2022-25 provides a valuable insight into the key sectors across southeast Wales and the challenges and opportunities they face.

As a follow-up activity, and to further enhance our youth-friendly Employment and Skills Plan, we are also in the process of producing a range of sector focussed career guides for advanced materials and manufacturing, compound semiconductors, construction, creative and the foundational economy.

These will be produced in a flip-book style and will clearly outline the priority sectors across the Cardiff Capital Region.

The documents will provide details about the sector's impact on the region, the job roles on offer and a corresponding careers roadmap.

The guides will help young people to make wellinformed decisions about their future and equip them for prosperous careers.

As soon as the career guides are available, we will share them with our networks and stakeholders.



#### **CCR SPF funded** Cluster Development and Growth Programme (CDGP)

The Cluster Growth and Development Programme (CDGP) is a £6.6 million initiative funded by the Cardiff Capital Region and the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF).



It aims to boost economic development in Southeast Wales through three projects: a skills programme, academic-industry partnerships, and a business growth programme. Projects will run through to March 2025.

The skills programme, led by Cardiff and Vale College (CAVC), has provided focus on the digital, net zero and advanced manufacturing sectors and has been driven by a network of stakeholders including PWC, HE, FE and specialist skills providers.

Through the CDGP, and over the last few months, CAVC and PWC have been engaging with employers and key industry bodies to identify skills gaps as part of the 'discovery phase'.

This research will then inform the development of targeted skills interventions which will be offered through to March 2025. Tackling skills shortages in key areas will create meaningful impact across priority clusters and wider investment programmes, as well as driving inward investment across the CCR.

A range of employer-led initiatives are now in development which will help address key skills shortages and create new talent pools for in-demand jobs.

### Funded training to enhance workplace Welsh language proficiency.

The learn Welsh sector is managed by the National Centre for Learning Welsh, which partners with eleven providers to deliver courses at various proficiency levels.

The Centre also provides funding to establish Welsh language training in workplaces through their Work Welsh scheme with the aim to enhance workplace proficiency in Welsh.

Work Welsh provides employers with fully subsidised, flexible, and diverse training options.

There are numerous alternatives available to accommodate learners of all skill levels, ranging from tutor-led virtual and face-to-face classes, online self-study, and residential for more advanced learners.
